Camera/Video Evaluation • Next Level Toastmasters

Delivering an effective contest speech on video or via videoconference (e.g., Zoom) has become increasingly important in Toastmasters. Many conferences, where speech contests take place, are now presented in an online or hybrid format using videoconferencing platforms, such as Zoom. The Regional Quarterfinals are now judged exclusively in video format. The 2022 finals of the World Championship of Public Speaking (WCPS) suggested that competing via videoconference may be an advantage, as a disproportionate number of semifinal contestants (compared to the larger number of those competing live at the convention venue at which the WCPS was held) advanced to the finals, and a contestant competing remotely placed second.

Next-Level Toastmasters has developed the following evaluation that particularly scrutinizes aspects of competing to a camera, as well as being videorecorded. This evaluation is expected to evolve as members learn more about what factors make for winning virtual delivery.

Note to evaluators: To avoid repetition from one evaluator to the next, Camera/Video Evaluator should avoid evaluating aspects of speech/delivery that do not differ from live speeches; for example, voice, grammar, and aspects of body language that don't specifically relate to being on camera.

Criterion	Evaluator Notes
Background Whether virtual* or real, background should not distract from the speaker.	
Hand Gestures +	
Hand gestures and body language should fully appear on camera. Face and head are consistently in frame. Because contestants typically compete in a standing position, speaker should stand unless speech content dictates different position(s). Avoid evaluating body language that is no different than it would be if speech were presented live.	
Avoidance of	
While some technical glitches are unanticipated and unavoidable, speaker should ensure volume and clarity of audio (not muffled, no feedback, static, echo, no soundpeaking, etc.), avoid background noise, and avoid freezing or other loss of network connection.	
Video-Specific	
Embellishments Effective use of elements that would be difficult to integrate into a live speech, such as music, closeups that show facial expressions, and small props that couldn't be seen in a live speech.	nds that contactants do not use virtual backgrounds for online contacts. If a contactant chooses to use a

^{*}Toastmasters International recommends that contestants do not use virtual backgrounds for online contests. If a contestant chooses to use a virtual background, the background is considered to be a prop.

Interaction with Camera	
Speaker's position in relation to the	
camera should fit the purpose and	
tone of the speech.	
In interacting with camera, speaker	
should appear to be talking directly	
to audience (akin to eye contact).	
Camera should appear to be directly	
in speaker's sightline. Any deviation	
from appearing to look directly into	
the camera should be purposeful.	
Ideally, lighting should be	
optimized so speaker does not	
appear in shadow or with glare on	
his/her glasses.	
Speaker should neither look like	
he/she she is reading notes nor	
actually use notes in a contest	
speech.	
Speech delivery may include use of	
camera-interaction tactics that	
create the illusion speaker is in	
same room with audience.	
Pauses	
Pauses should be of an appropriate	
length for an unseen audience; e.g.,	
a pause for laughter in an online	
speech will seem unnaturally long.	
specen win seem annaturally long.
